- The show premiered in January 2008 and continued for five seasons through September 2013. It has been consistently rated as one of the best television series of all-time and received numerous awards.

Technical Expertise is Not Enough



ISF

- Half-Measure: Only utilizing CMS/HHS reporting for completeness and accuracy metrics/KPIs, and/or not performing a leakage analysis and data inventory that extends back to the moment the member sets foot in a provider's office.
- Half-Measure: Punting operational improvement for risk and quality to IT with little/no/inappropriate business oversight, and/or excluding other data quality key stakeholders, such as enrollment, claims, provider systems, care management, etc..



- Half Measure: Not clearly identifying all stakeholders related to data quality and not knowing that many of them are outside of risk and quality

- Half Measure: Not strategically investing in the people, processes and technologies that have the greatest ROI related to risk and quality programs
- Half Measure: Skimping on spending for cybersecurity and data privacy strategy
